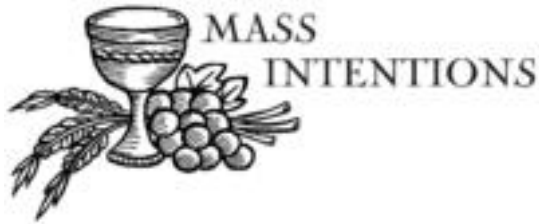

Recalling St. Valentine

While February 14th is celebrated annually by many as a day for romance, red hearts, public displays of affection, gifts of roses, flowers, and candy to a special loved one, etc., the man associated with this day, Valentinus or Valentine as he has come to be known through the centuries is one among many martyrs violently put to death during the persecution of early Christians in first four centuries. How did the day of this death become a day for expressions of celebrating human love?

Like many Christian saints of the early church who were martyred, little biographical information and personal details are actually known about their historical lives. The day in which they entered into eternal glory by violence was remembered along with recalling stories about their heroic virtues, defying civil authorities, and the willingness to suffer death for the sake of the Christian faith. St. Valentine exemplifies this pattern.

Several stories abound regarding what led to the death of St. Valentine and why he has been remembered through the centuries. He was a Roman priest who lived in the 3rd century when the Roman emperor Claudius II was persecuting the Christian church. The emperor issued an edict prohibiting young couples from marrying, primarily because he felt that unmarried soldiers, free from marriage obligations and family concerns would fight more fiercely and not be afraid to engage in battles. Valentine defied this edict and secretly performed weddings. Eventually he was apprehended, imprisoned, and tortured for violating the emperor's command about performing marriage ceremonies.

While in prison, he was befriended by his jailer, a man named Asterius whose daughter, Julia was blind from birth. Valentine prayed with the blind young girl and healed her from her blindness. This cure led to Asterius and Julia becoming Christians; however, this miracle did not spare Valentine's life.

On February 14, 270 A.D., Valentine was sentenced to a three-part execution (beating, stoning, and decapitation) because of his stance in upholding Christian marriage. Tradition has it that the evening prior to his death, he wrote a letter to Julia, Asterius' daughter, encouraging her to thank God for the healing she experienced in being able to see and to remain steadfast in the Christian faith. He concluded his letter with the signature "*From Your Valentine.*"

While the origin of this holiday may not reflect the popular romantic sense in which this day is presently celebrated, this saint reminds us about the importance and meaning of discovering the love of God in the human experience of loving others in the difficult moments of our human lives, even to the point of suffering and death.

God's true love for us as manifested in human sacrificial love for others never fail.

Quinto Domingo en Tiempo Ordinario

We join Jesus in Capernaum and Paul with the Corinthians and discover the importance of the oral teaching, preaching the word of God. We are accustomed to read, whether the sacred scriptures or inspirational books, but we are provided with the spoken word in Sunday homilies, television teaching and radio lectures.

All are meant to inform, form and transform us. Unfortunately, we can fall into the trap of not listening with attention. We might find it hard to overcome an accent, or distracted by those around us. A simple lesson can help us.

Like the young Samuel ask the Lord to speak because I am trying to listen. Surely there is one word, one phrase or sentence which can provide a great treasure for meditation, rather than turn the dial to off, or the remote to mute.

Simon said 'everyone is looking for you' and we are among those who need to find, listen and reflect upon the gift the Lord offers us through His many instruments. I provide what every preacher needs: a good listener.

Al igual que el joven Samuel le pide al Señor que hable, yo también, porque estoy tratando de escuchar. Seguramente hay una palabra, una frase u oración que puede proveer un gran tesoro para meditación, en vez de bajar o apagar el volumen.

Simón dijo 'Todos te andan buscando' y nosotros estamos entre los que necesitan encontrar, escuchar y reflexionar acerca del don que el Señor nos ofrece a través de sus muchos instrumentos. Yo proveo lo que todo predicador necesita: alguien que sabe escuchar.

World Day of the Sick

The World Day of the Sick is observed annually on February 11th, the memorial of *Our Lady of Lourdes*. This day highlights the healing ministry of the Church and reminds us that service to the sick and suffering cannot be neglected. It recognizes the great efforts and contributions of the medical profession, doctors, nurses, health care institutions and pastoral care givers to restore health to those afflicted with illness and disease.

In designating this special day in 1992, Saint Pope John Paul II noted this annual observance as "*a special time of prayer and sharing, of offering one's suffering for the good of the Church, and of reminding us to see in our sick brother and sister the face of Christ who, by suffering, dying and rising, achieved the salvation of humanity.*"

As participant in the Priests of the Archdiocese Pilgrimage/Retreat in France (February 5-12), Fr. Kerrigan will be in Lourdes on February 11th. During the special Mass celebrated at the shrine, our parishioners who are sick, homebound, and infirm, those who were recently anointed at Manhattanville Health Care Center, and other intentions commended to prayer will be remembered that day.
