HIS WORD TODAY

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

April 5, 2015

“Very early when the sun had risen, on the first day of the week, they came to the tomb. They were saying to one another, ‘Who will roll back the stone for us from the entrance of the tomb?’ When they looked up, they saw that the stone had been rolled back; it was very large....He said to them, ‘Do not be afraid! You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the crucified. He has been raised up, he is not here. Behold the place where they laid him. But go and tell the disciples and Peter... There you will see him as he told you.”

What a wonderful discovery, an empty tomb. How important the witness of the young man, and the women. Imagine the conversation as they were walking to the tomb, grieving, feeling sad, and not ready to meet the young man. Like the disciples on the road to Emmaus, they walked and talked. The Jesus who had spent his ministry with them, is now not only deceased, but His body is missing. They had a right to be saddened and disappointed.

The reassuring word of the young man still left them wondering. The message of Easter joy would gradually replace doubt, fear, bewilderment. That word is meant for us. We roll back the stone which blinds us to the person of Jesus. The deep joy which the Easter mystery generates is to raise us up.

The full meaning of the Easter mystery is sometimes slow to move our hearts, yet it is the center of our faith, Jesus died to save us and lives to accompany us each and every day. Our faith tells us to go and tell others of the great victory Christ has won for us today. Others are seeking Jesus and we are the bearers of His good news.

Domingo de Pascua de la Resurrección del Señor

5 de abril de 2015

“A la madrugada del primer día de la semana, cuando salía el sol, fueron al sepulcro. Y decían entre ellas: ‘¿Quién nos correrá la piedra de la entrada del sepulcro?’ Pero al mirar, vieron que la piedra había sido corrida; era una piedra muy grande... El les dijo: ‘No teman. Ustedes buscan a Jesús de Nazaret, el Crucificado. Ha resucitado, no está aquí. Miren el lugar donde lo habían puesto. Vayan ahora a decir a sus discípulos y a Pedro que El irá antes que ustedes a Galilea; allí lo verán, como El se los había dicho.”

Qué maravilloso descubrimiento: una tumba vacía. Qué importante la presencia del joven y las mujeres. Imagine la conversación mientras caminaban hacia el sepulcro, su gran dolor, su tristeza, y sin saber que encontrarían al joven. Como los discípulos en el camino a Emaús, caminaban y hablaban. El Jesús que había hecho su ministerio entre ellos, no sólo ha muerto, sino cuyo cuerpo ha desaparecido. Tenían todo derecho de estar tristes y desilucionadas.

Las tranquilizadoras palabras del joven las dejaron pensando. El mensaje de la alegría de la Pascua gradualmente reemplazaría la duda, el miedo, y el asombro. Esa palabra se nos dirige a nosotros. Corremos la piedra que nos ciega de la persona de Jesús. La tremenda alegría que el misterio Pascual genera nos eleva.

El completo significado del misterio Pascual a veces tarda en conmover nuestros corazones, pero sin embargo es el centro de nuestra fe: Jesús murió para salvarnos y vive para acompañarnos cada día. Nuestra fe nos dice que vayamos a decirles a otros de la gran victoria que Cristo ha ganado para nosotros hoy. Otros buscan a Jesús y nosotros somos los portadores de Sus buenas nuevas.
